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Artist Statement

These works are inspired by life in America. Through metaphor and titles, this work aims to make commentary on various aspects of the state of affairs in this country over the last decade. In *Two Households…*, I use imagery from the early days of the Cold War: Russian planes, and American planes, both alike in dignity, both now decaying in a wasteland of memory and nostalgic history. In *From Ancient Grudge Break to New Mutiny*, I use similar imagery of abandoned aircraft from the Korean War. These relics from that time have been marked with tags of new rivals, who for fight blindly in the name of their predecessors' fight. *With "In the Pursuit of Happiness*", I use the image of person who takes on the notion of what happiness should be and dares anyone to tell her differently.
