Artist's Statement by Tibby Lerner City Council Chamber Exhibit

The selection of photographs for this exhibit was inspired by the beauty, history and culture of Benicia.

The first collection is called Iconic Benicia Images. Influenced by vintage travel posters, I designated six locations, the Marina, The Train Depot, The Pier, The Boatyard, The Clock Tower and Bookshop Benicia. These places are frequently visited by both residents and visitors, and they exemplify our love affair with the water, the history and community that is Benicia.

Workmanship is highlighted in the magnificent wood floors in the Commander's Quarters, now the home of Arts Benicia. I chose a black and white presentation to call attention to the careful design shown here. A more recent work of art, painted bricks on D street, inspired a bright abstract photograph designed with the help of some apps.

Continuing to embrace the careful construction of a bygone era, I chose the Headquarters Building and the Camel Barn as subjects. The Headquarters entryway is a photographer's challenge, with subtle lighting within contrasting with bright sunlight coming through large windows and doors.

The Spenger Garden behind the Camel Barn at the Benicia Historical Museum is a hidden treasure not to missed. I managed to catch it in full summer bloom.
