Joy is something in short supply in today's world. So, as I experience the enjoyment of the creative painting experience, it is my hope to transmit some of that feeling out to the world.

The Simple & The Complex

I enjoy taking simple geometric shapes and using them as the bases for exploration. Intersections, overlaps, layers and textures lead to often lovely and unexpected shapes & colors. I delight in using an array of media, including extra heavy gels, to play with transparent, translucent and semi-opaque layers. I like taking simple tools such as combs, forks and even fingers to make a wide range of textures.

Given my decades of experience as an Architect and Urban Planner, I am naturally attracted to city-scapes as a subject matter, not so much as a means of recording, but in order to sometimes find hidden or unusual effects. These can be due to the environment, weather, lighting etc, or geometry. An example might my painting Three Towers, inspired by the

discovery on a San Francisco Bay Ferry Ride, that from a particular viewpoint, the Coit Tower, the Transamerica Tower and the Salesforce Tower, each one of which is unique, all appear to be the same height.

Another example might be the painting "Golden Gate" in which the iconic bridge is backlit on a cold, windy and overcast day, virtually obliterating any perception of the bright orange paint job and rendering the bridge, the bay and the adjoining headlands all in muted grey, blacks & blues.

I will keep searching for situations that surprise and delight and try to keep illustrating them for you.
